MINUTES FROM MEETING HELD March 15, 2021

I. OLD BUSINESS

A. Approval of Minutes – February 15, 2021

Members received and reviewed written copies of the minutes from the February 15, 2021 meeting. The minutes were approved unanimously as follows:

II. NEW BUSINESS

A. Financial & Operational Reports

1. Status of Accounts – February Dirk Verhoeff reviewed the status of accounts through February 2021. All revenue line items above budget except for Landfill Gas revenues and interest revenues. Landfill fees were slightly below budget. Dirk Verhoeff stated that the presented budget report is on a cash basis and therefore reports only invoices paid as of the date the report was generated. Landfill fees for credit customers are due the 20th of each month. Major expenses for the landfill operations budget were utilities due to a major water leak on a four inch line, legal fees, equipment purchases and gas & oil.

2. Rainfall Report

Dirk Verhoeff reviewed the rainfall data through March 12th. Dirk reported that rainfall has been below normal through February.

3. Employee Lease Agreement – City of Dalton
Dirk Verhoeff and Henry Tharpe presented a revised employee lease
agreement with the City of Dalton.

B. Construction / Special Project Report

1. Methane Gas Project Update Seth Lassitter reviewed the 13-month summary of the end user's usage of landfill gas through the month of February. NYMEX futures have increased from \$2.760 per MMBTU in February to \$2.854 per MMBTU for March. Once again, the Authority was not able to provide the minimum take-or-pay quantity of 9720 MMBTU. Therefore, Trinseo only paid for the LFG they used. Seth briefed the Board on some operational issues with the newly installed 200 hp compressor. Mike Babb asked if there was a warranty which Dirk Verhoeff replied that the one-year warranty has expired. Seth also informed the Board that the one circuit on the glycol chiller has failed resulting in two lost compressors.

DOJ requires Republic to divest assets to proceed with Santek acquisition

The DOJ said that without the divestiture, the proposed acquisition would lessen competition in six local markets across the Southeast.

The <u>U.S. Department of Justice</u> announced March 31 that <u>Republic Services Inc.</u>, Phoenix, will be required to divest waste collection and disposal assets in five states in order to proceed with its acquisition of <u>Santek Waste Services LLC</u>, Cleveland, Tennessee. The department says that without the divestiture, the proposed acquisition would substantially lessen competition for small container commercial waste collection and municipal solid waste disposal services in six local markets across the southeastern United States.

The department's Antitrust Division—along with the Alabama Attorney General—filed a civil antitrust lawsuit in the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia to block the proposed transaction. At the same time, the department filed a proposed settlement that, if approved by the court, would resolve the competitive harm alleged in the department's complaint.

"The waste collection and disposal services provided by Republic and Santek are essential services for businesses, municipalities and towns," DOJ Antitrust Division Acting Assistant Attorney General Richard A. Powers says in a written statement. "Today's settlement, which requires Republic and Santek to divest numerous facilities and assets in five states, will ensure that these customers continue to benefit from competition for these critical services."

According to the complaint, Republic and Santek provide small container commercial waste collection and municipal solid waste disposal services. In each of the local markets alleged in the complaint, Republic and Santek compete against each other and are two of only a few significant providers of one or both of these essential services. The combination of the two companies would eliminate head-to-head competition between them and threaten the lower prices and better service that customers have realized from that competition, the DOJ notes in the statement.

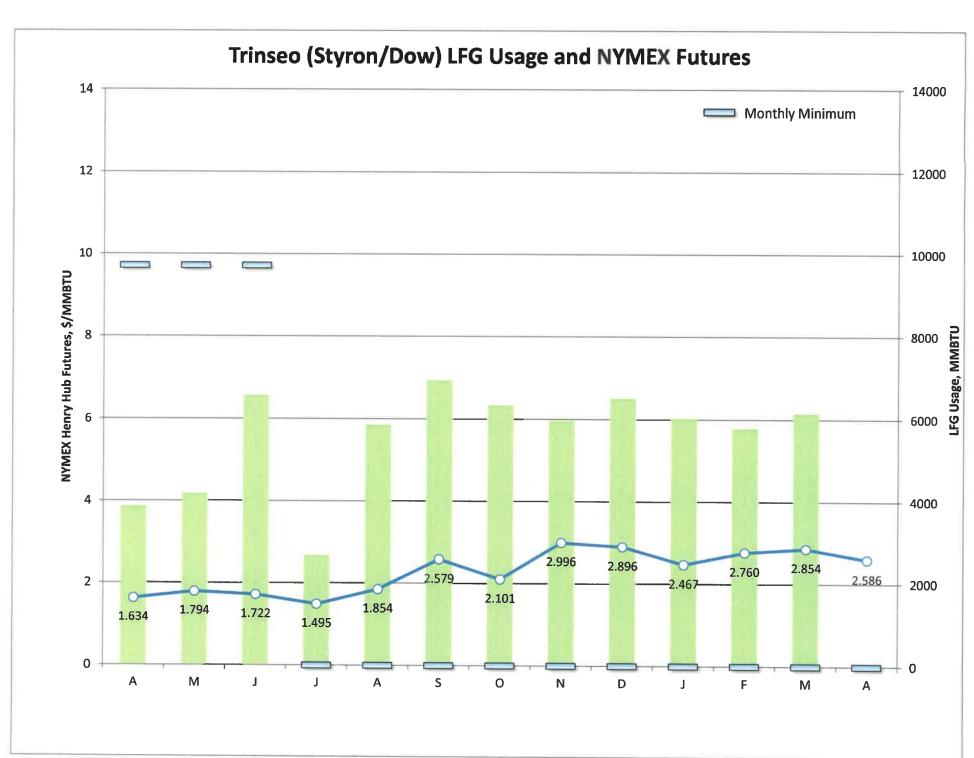
The complaint further alleges that, in the Chattanooga, Tennessee, and northern Georgia area, the proposed acquisition would limit the ability of collection rivals to compete with the merged company's collection operations. The combination of these two vertically integrated companies that are both strong in collection and disposal in this market would give the merged company an increased incentive and ability to weaken its collection competitors by raising the price of disposal, a key input for collection services. With limited alternative disposal options left in the market, collection rivals would have to incur higher disposal costs or cease their operations, thereby reducing competition in the collection market.

Under the terms of the proposed settlement, Republic and Santek must divest landfills, transfer stations, hauling locations, and waste collection routes in Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee and Mississippi to New York City-based <u>Kinderhook Industries LLC</u>, or to an alternate acquirer approved by the United States. Kinderhook is a private investment firm whose portfolio companies include <u>Capital Waste Services LLC</u>, Columbia, South Carolina, and EcoSouth Services of Mobile LLC, Axis, Alabama.

The proposed settlement also requires that Republic and Santek divest waste collection routes and associated assets in Texas to <u>Waste Connections Inc.</u>, Ontario, or to an alternate acquirer approved by the United States. WCN is a provider of small container commercial waste collection and municipal solid waste disposal services in local markets in Canada and the United States.

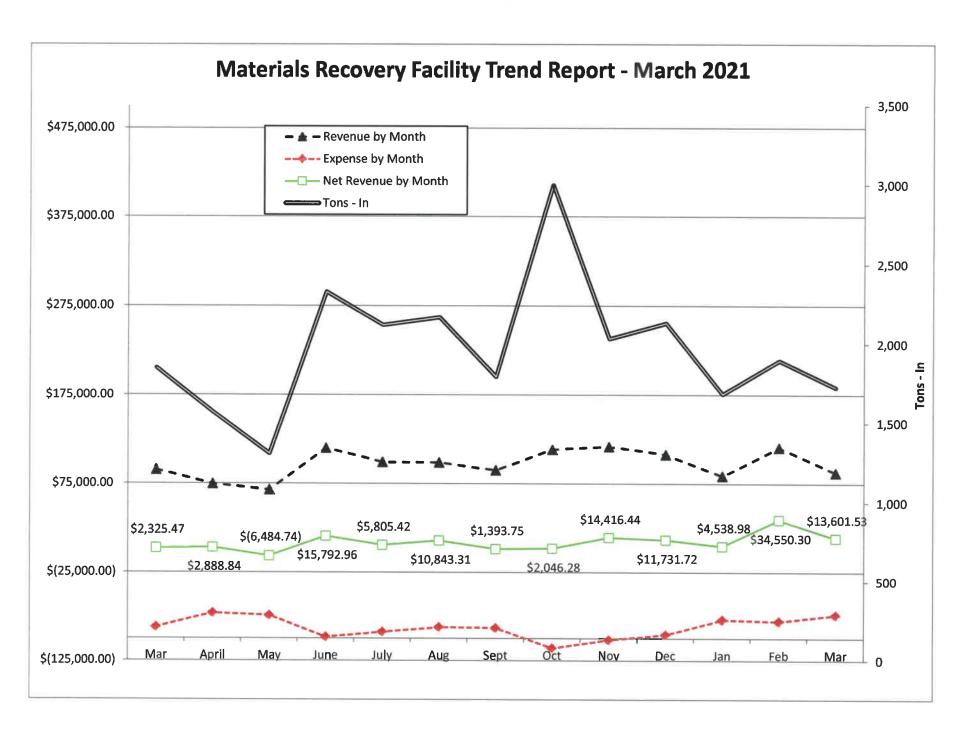

During the month of March 2021 all of the schools recycling with Target Recycling collected a total of 48,810 pounds of recyclable materials for a recycling rate of 2.7 pounds per student.

That saves approximately 414 trees! It also weighs approximately 390 white-tailed deer (125)! So be a "deer" and recycle this month!

Target Recycling, managed by the Dalton-Whitfield Solid Waste Authority's Recycling Center in Dalton, provides collection of recyclables at no charge to local businesses and schools interested in recycling. Recycling collection saves local school districts hundreds of dollars in waste collection fees each month.

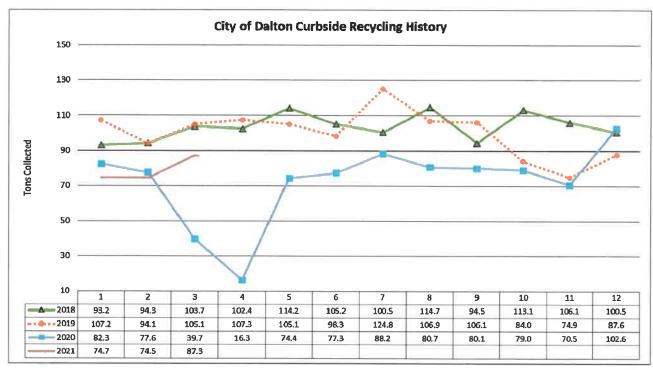


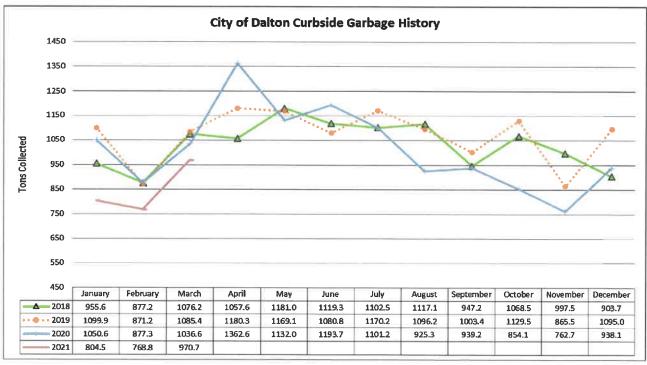
City of Dalton Curbside Recycling Report - March 2021

The City of Dalton Curbside Recycling Program collected 87.3 tons (174,540 lbs.) of recyclables in March 2021. It's a 119.9% increase compared to March 2020 when 39.7 tons were collected. 87.3 tons saves 145 cubic yards of landfill space. 970.7 tons (1,941,340 lbs.) of garbage was disposed of in March 2021 by the City of Dalton. It's a decrease of 6.4%

compared to 1036.6 tons collected in March 2020. The waste diversion rate for March 2021 is 8.3%. The Dalton-Whitfield Solid Waste Authority has credited the City of Dalton Public Works Department \$2,618.10 for the revenue sharing of recyclables received in March 2021.
